CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

1. The conference is scheduled to be held in one day – April 2, 2019, **from 10 to 17 hours**. Meetings will be held at the Faculty of Law of the St. Petersburg State University of Economics (7/6 Krasnoarmeyskaya st. 6/8, **entrance from the courtyard**, tel. 8 (812) 495-39-61).

2. The building has access control. Lists of participants of the conference will be transferred to the reception desk, and each participant should have **an identity document** with him.

3. The working language of the event is Russian (English for foreign participants).

4. The speakers who have indicated this in their applications, at their request, will receive **certificates** confirming their participation in the event.

5. Time limit for speeches:

- report at the plenary session – up to 20 minutes;
- report at the sectional session – up to 15 minutes;
- speeches in the debate on the reports – up to 5 minutes.

The chairperson of the plenary or sectional session has the right to interrupt the presentation of the speaker who did not meet the time limit allowed by the present regulations.

6. It is assumed that part of the audience will be students, not all of whom are able to perceive complex information by ear. Therefore, the speakers are encouraged to prepare handouts or slides (e. g., diagrams, charts and graphs) for materials that require intense attention, that can be displayed on the screen. This will save time for speakers and listeners. The chairperson shall be informed about the presence of such materials before the meeting, in order to properly organise their distribution or display. The classrooms in which it is planned to hold meetings have the equipment to demonstrate illustrative materials, presentations, etc. on the screen.

7. After the conference, the publication of a **collection of articles** based on the reports presented is planned. The collection is supposed to be released under the title «The Legal Museum» (with the subject of the conference in the subtitle of the book). The participants of the event will be invited to submit their articles **until mid-September 2019**. More details about the requirements for the preparation of texts participants will be notified by e-mail in April – May 2019.
